

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Grid locked Hagley

When is house building in Hagley going to cease? Over the last few years, we have seen a dramatic increase in developments, which have put an enormous strain on the village resources, especially on our inadequate road system.

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Turning right out of Church Street can be very difficult, due to large articulated vehicles parked outside the shops, obstructing the view of traffic coming up the village.

The building of 60 odd houses on the old sewage works is causing chaos for the residents of Milestone and Cavendish Drives with a regular flow of 40 ton lorries in and out of the site on a daily basis. The roads and kerbs too are suffering and breaking up, with potholes appearing everywhere. This site was started in February 2004 and is not due for completion until December 2005. No wonder that so many houses are up for sale or rent in this area as residents have had enough.

With new houses in Sweetpool Lane, Brake Lane, The Sidings (by the station), Worcester Lane, Cavendish (sewage works), and the proposed developments in Woodland Avenue, and Park Road, we shall be at gridlock. There will also be the problem of extra traffic generated when the Haybridge High School is doubled in size.

Is it not time that Worcestershire County Council Highways Partnership and Bromsgrove Planning Departments got together to sort out this mess (which they are responsible for creating in the first place) and stopped any further developments in the area.





Continue to be the eyes and ears of our community. be a good neighbour, especially to the elderly and those living alone. There are still incidents of bogus callers operating in the area.



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
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CLUB REPORTS

HISTORICAL AND FIELD SOCIETY

The March meeting of the Society saw the welcome return of Mr Ralph Richardson to give an illustrated talk on The Sheldons of Beoley. The Sheldon family originated from Rowley

where they had made their fortune from coal in the 15th century. This enabled them to purchase a country estate at Beoley, a village near Redditch. Throughout the 16th and 17th century the family prospered mainly through astute marriages into wealthy families. The remarkable achievement during this period was that the family managed to remain Catholic during the upheavals of the reformation. They had a small chapel built, attached to the side of the village church, in which th Catholic rites could be performed. This can still be seen today together with the magnificent family tombs in the church itself.

Today the family's main claim to fame is probably their pioneering of the production of tapestries in England during the 16th century. The secret of the method of manufacture they obtained by spying on the producers in Flanders. Examples of Sheldon tapestries still exist and can be seen displayed in the V&A museum and at Warwick Castle.

The next meeting of the Society is on Tuesday May 3rd at which Mr Tim Bridges will talk about, "The Hore Collection of Medieval Tile Paintings". Visitors and new members are all welcome at St. Saviour's Church Hall at 8pm. Visitors £1.50 including refreshments.

David Phillips who gained a Gold Award and "best in school" is in the top 500 Mathematicians of this age group in the country. He has qualified for the Maths Olympiad paper of two hours.

Oliver Preston won the Parliamentary History Essay competition. His prize was a guided tour of the Houses of Parliament, a cheque for £150, books and a magazine subscription for the school.

On 10th March was the annual Spring Concert, a tremendous event, demonstrating the wonderful talents and abilities of our pupils.
